

In addition to being a pioneering astronomer, Neil was also an avid mountain climber.



In 2015, he performed for the second time a solo ascent of the El Capitan peak in the Yosemite Rockies via the hard *Nose Route*.

Pioneer of multi-wavelength astronomy


As Project Scientist of the *Compton Gamma-Ray Observatory* and then as Mission Scientist of the European *INTEGRAL* mission, Neil Gehrels has reinforced his conviction that the multi-wavelength approach is an absolute necessity for gamma astronomy.





Initiator of a mission dedicated to GRBs


In 1998, inspired by the breakthrough initiated by *Beppo-SAX*, Neil proposed to NASA the *SWIFT* mission dedicated to GRBs.



Thanks to Neil's remarkable skill in navigating the bureaucratic labyrinths through which large space missions must be shepherded, the SWIFT mission was selected in the framework of the NASA Explorer Program.

Leader of a remarkable scientific success


